## 1. Purpose of Paper

The aim of this report is to update the Strategic Partnership on the 2011 Census, specifically;

- The release of Key and Quick Statistics from the 2011 Census
- The timing of future releases, the type of data and available geographies

## **2. Introduction and background**

A census is a count of people and households, and is used to set policies and estimate the resources required to provide services for the population.

The information the census provides allows central and local government, health authorities and many other organisations to target their resources more effectively and to plan housing, education, health and transport services for years to come.

Themes will include Economy & Employment, Housing, Health & Wellbeing, Education & Learning, Population, Transport, Deprivation, Equalities and Migration. There will also be an overall City Profile.

## **3. Currently released 2011 Census data**

Due to the breadth and depth of the 2011 Census results, the statistics on the main resident population base (usual residents) will be released in four stages from July 2012 till October 2013.

### **3.1 Census data released before December's BHSP**

- Age and sex, and occupied households estimates by local authority, region and country.
- Number of people with second addresses

#### **Key headlines**

The resident population of Brighton & Hove is 273,369, an increase of 25,552 (10.3%) compared to the 2001 Census.

Brighton & Hove has 121,540 households with at least one resident. This is an increase of 7,061 (6.2%) compared to the 2001 Census.

More than one in twenty residents (16,659 people, 6.1%) also live at a second address in a different local authority or region for more than 30 days of the year. This is twice as many people that have a second address within Brighton & Hove (7,630 people).

### 3.2 Census data released since December's BHSP

- Usual resident population estimates by single year of age for local authorities, wards and geographies below ward level.
- Key and Quick Statistic at the Local Authority level, wards and geographies below ward level. Data released includes;
  - Ethnicity, nationality and county of birth
  - Adults not in employment and dependent children and people with long term health problem or disability for all households
  - Health and provision of unpaid care
  - Lone parent households with dependent children
  - Car and van availability
  - Qualifications and students
  - Tenure, dwellings, household spaces and accommodation type

#### Key headlines

**Household Composition:** More than a third of household in Brighton & Hove (44,294 households, 36.4%) are one person households. This compares to only 28.8% of households in the South East and 30.2% of households in England. The total number of one person household is similar to the 2001 Census. The number of residents aged 65 and over living alone has fallen by 3,811 while the number of residents aged under 65 living alone has increased by 3,059.

**Housing Tenure:** Nearly a third of households in the city are private renters (35,959 households, 29.6%) almost double that found in the South East (16.3%) and England (16.8%). Over a half of households are owner occupiers (64,790 households, 53.3%) a fall of 5,151 (7.4%) compared to the 2001 Census.

**Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) community:** One out of five Brighton & Hove residents (53,351, 19.5%) are from a BME background, an increase of 23,668 people (79.7%) compared to the 2001 Census.

**Country of Birth:** More than four out of five city residents (221,829 people, 81.1%) were born in England, proportionally less compared to the South East (84.8%) and England (83.5%). A further 14,739 (5.4%) residents were born within the European Union, 10,650 (3.9%) in the Middle East and Asia, 6,860 (2.5%) were born in Africa, 3,972 (1.5%)

were born in The Americas and the Caribbean and 1,655 (0.6%) were born in Oceania.

**Long Term Health Problem or Disability:** For more than one in twenty residents (20,445 people, 7.5%) day to day activities are 'limited a lot' due to a long term health problem or disability. For a further 24,124 residents (8.8%) day to day activity is 'limited a little'. Both proportions are similar to those seen in the South East and in England.

**Provision of unpaid care:** Nearly one in ten city resident's (23,987 people, 8.8%) provide unpaid care to a family member, friend or neighbour who has either a long term illness or disability or problems related to old age. Although a rise of 2,184 people since the 2001 Census, as a proportion of the total population it remains the same.

**Civil partnership status:** One percent of residents aged 16 or over (2,346 people) are registered in a same-sex civil partnership, around four or five times more than in the South East (0.2%) and England (0.2%).

**Car/Van Ownership:** There are 0.86 cars per household in Brighton & Hove, the lowest level of car/van ownership in the South East. Over a third of households (46,415, 38%) don't own a car and the city now has the 7<sup>th</sup> lowest level of car ownership in England and Wales (outside of London). Brighton & Hove bucks the national trend with decreasing car ownership levels since the 2001 Census, compared to increases in the South East and England

#### **4. Further 2011 Census data releases**

##### **March 2013 – June 2013**

Multi-variable statistics, including for example

- Age by sex and resident type
- Sex and age by ethnic group
- Sex and age by economic activity
- Sex and age by general health and provision of unpaid care
- Country of birth by age and sex
- Sex and occupation by age
- Dwelling type and accommodation type by household space type

Statistics will be released in three phases, according to geography.

**First phase** – Geographies below ward level, local authority, regions and country

**Second phase** – Ward level

**Third phase** - Parishes, parliamentary constituencies, health areas, postcode sectors, and national parks.

**July 2013 – October 2013**

### **Detailed Characteristics and Themed tables**

Examples of detailed characteristics tables included;

- Age and highest level of qualification by ethnic group
- Number of employed people and method of travel to work by number of cars or vans in household.

Themed Tables where data is collated and presented on a specific topic, for example;

- Health and long-term health problem or disability
- Ethnicity
- Households with people aged over 65

The tables will be made available for higher level geographies including wards, unitary and local authorities, regions, country, health areas, and national parks. However, they will not be available for census output areas or lower super output areas.
